Pact for Impact – Presentation Note

France has long been committed to develop Social and Solidarity Economy (SSE) and Inclusive Economy and strongly believes that they should be placed on the international political agenda. The contribution of these types of economy to the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) should be acknowledged and strengthened at the international level. Social and Inclusive Economy is a source of growth that fosters sustainable and innovative solutions to today's economic, social, and ecological challenges.

It is time for policy makers to **encourage international collaboration around Social and Inclusive economy**, and mobilize governments, international and local organizations, stakeholders and networks around the globe. Since the beginning of the year, France is the chair of the Luxembourg Declaration Committee, a group that includes 14 Member states of the European Union. France also hosts this year the G7, which has made fighting inequality a priority.

In this context the French High Commissioner for the Social and Solidarity Economy and Social Innovation, Christophe Itier, has announced an **international meeting to launch *Pact for Impact*, a global Alliance of governments, institutions, and actors of the SSE, Inclusive Economy, and Social Innovation.**

The ***Pact for Impact Summit - Paris 2019*** will be held on 10 and 11 July 2019 in Paris, at the **musée du quai Branly- Jacques Chirac**. This is an opportunity for stakeholders from around the globe to come together and work collectively and proposals of **concrete measures** that foster Social and Inclusive Economy on an international scale. To make this Summit a success, this collaborative effort will be supported by governments and international and local organizations, through the signing of a **common *Manifesto***, whereby they will voluntarily commit to promote Social and Inclusive Economy.

Pact for Impact is a true global Alliance in which governments already working towards Social and Inclusive economic goals can come together with stakeholders inspired by the same values. This will be an opportunity to lay the groundwork for an ambitious and targeted roadmap that will guide actors into making concrete commitments and, thereby, further strengthen their contribution to Social and Inclusive Economy.



1. Pact for Impact Summit will take place the 10th and 11th July and will gather thirty States as well as many actors worldwide from the Social and Inclusive Economy ecosystem.

The Summit will host government delegations, international organizations, local authorities, and actors committed to fostering the Social and Inclusive Economy. World experts, speakers with recent inspiring success stories, local actors from all continents, and public and private partners committed to meeting the challenges of our century, will also attend.

More than 400 actors committed to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals and inspired by the values of the Social and Solidarity Economy will be present. This is a concrete Alliance, with every stakeholder working towards a common goal: collectively designing a roadmap for a new global economy.

2. Pact for Impact 2019's ambition is to allow a time of collective work and efforts: to make it happen, dedicated slots and appropriate formats are planned.
